Irish Language Scheme for the Educational Research Centre

2025-2028

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Introduction

Background

This is the Educational Research Centre's (ERC) first Irish Language Scheme and it will be in effect for the period 2025-2028. The Official Languages Act 2003 provides for the preparation by public bodies of a language scheme detailing the services they will provide:

- through the medium of Irish;
- through the medium of English, and;
- through the medium of Irish and English;

and the measures to be adopted to ensure that any service not currently provided by the ERC through the medium of the Irish language will be so provided within an agreed timeframe.

We are committed to providing a professional, efficient and courteous service to the public with a view to evaluating and improving our service over time.

Preparation

In the preparation of this scheme, due regard has been given to the 2024 National Plan for Irish Language Public Services and guidance issued by the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media. The ERC is guided by the principle that the provision of Irish language services should be based on:

- the underlying level of demand for specific services in the Irish language;
- the importance of a proactive approach to the provision of such services, and;
- the resources, including human and financial resources, and the capacity of the ERC to develop or access the necessary language capability.

This scheme complements the principles of Quality Customer Service and our Customer Charter. This scheme has been formulated with the intention of ensuring that all relevant obligations under the Official Languages Act by the ERC will be fully addressed on an incremental basis, through this and future schemes.

Commencement date of the Scheme

This draft Scheme will be sent to the Minister Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media. It commences with effect from 26/02/2025 and shall remain in force for a period of three years or until a new scheme has been confirmed, whichever is the later.

Overview of the ERC

The Educational Research Centre ('ERC') is a public research institution dedicated to advancing educational research and informing policy that enhances the quality and equity of education in Ireland.

The ERC was originally founded in 1966 in St Patrick's College (now part of Dublin City University), Drumcondra. In September 2015, the ERC was established as a designated statutory body of the Department of Education under Section 54 of the Education Act (1998). The ERC is funded through a grant from the Department of Education and through the sales of standardised tests to schools.

The establishing legislation of the ERC (SI 392/2015) sets out the purpose of the organisation, as follows:

- a) Provide an assessment support service to schools and centres for education that will enable them to fulfil their obligations under Section 9 of the Education Act 1988; and
- b) Conduct independent research on all aspects of education and at all levels of the education system including educational research that will inform policy making and the improvement of educational standards.

Our Mission, Vision and Values

Our mission

The Mission of the ERC is to enhance learning outcomes for all students by conducting high-quality research and by developing effective assessment tools that will support better learning and inform policy.

As a foundational statement, our mission seeks to reflect the ERC's commitment to conducting research, advancing knowledge, and contributing insights that facilitate the improvement of educational practices and policies.

Our vision

Our vision, working in partnership with the Department of Education and key national and international stakeholders, is to optimise educational outcomes for the next generation by supporting schools, teachers, parents and all involved in policy/curriculum development to better understand and guide the learning journey.

Our vision recognises the ERC as an authoritative voice on student achievement and educational research.

Our values

It is important that the Department of Education, as our parent Department, and stakeholders have confidence in our ability to conduct our work while maintaining the highest levels of integrity and objectivity. Our values enable stakeholders to have this confidence. These values collectively guide the ERC in fulfilling its mission for the benefit of students, educators, and the broader education sector. The following values guide how we conduct our work:

Quality - We are committed to excellence. We ensure that our research is thorough, accurate, and reliable.

Impact - We aim to make a real difference with our research. We want our work to support policy makers and inform public debate.

- The Department of Education and other public bodies
- Researchers
- Online audiences

We also recognise that we have internal customers which includes our staff, both permanent and temporary.

Provision of Services in English only or Bilingually

Where the ERC interacts with the public such interaction is, in the main, conducted through postal and email correspondence, phone, website and visits by appointment. The variety of methods of communication ensures versatility and flexibility for our customers to ensure they receive the service they require in the most appropriate manner.

The ERC primarily provides its services to its key stakeholders and to the general public through the medium of the English Language.

We will endeavour to interact through the medium of Irish upon request. However, due to the technical nature of some of the terminology used in educational research, in some instances we may have to interact through the medium of English. This may be necessary in order to ensure clarity and consistency in our communications.

Enhancing the provision of Irish Language Services in Gaeltacht Areas

The ERC does not have offices situated in Gaeltacht areas. As noted above, where our research activities involve engagement with schools or centres of education in Gaeltacht Areas we use fluent Irish researchers insofar as possible.

Improving Language Capability

Recruitment and Development of staff

The recruitment of staff with the appropriate level of competence in the Irish language will be the primary means of optimising the availability of services through Irish. Our recruitment strategy will have regard to the need to improve Irish language capability on an incremental basis. All new staff will be briefed on our Irish Language Scheme in their induction training to ensure that they are aware of our commitments under the legislation.

Having regard to Government policy for enhanced provision of services in Irish, the ERC will identify all posts for which Irish language competency is an essential requirement. Every effort will be made to fulfil these requirements within the timeframe of this scheme having regard to recruitment, promotion and training policies, as appropriate. This will enable the ERC to plan and prioritise the incremental improvement of services in Irish in a more strategic manner.

The ERC is committed to making opportunities available for staff to attend appropriately accredited Irish language training courses, as resources permit. All staff will be advised of facilities/opportunities to improve their competency in Irish.
